





The Jonathan Ruffer Curatorial Grants Scheme

- Established through the auspices of philanthropist Jonathan Ruffer and art dealer Anthony Mould.
- Financially supports UK curators, scholars and researchers to develop curatorial expertise, collections-based knowledge and art historical interests.
- Awards grants totalling approximately £50,000 annually.
- •Minimum grant £200, with no maximum. Will consider 100 % funding.
- Since 2011 we have supported nearly 150 curators with grants totalling more than £150,000.

Supported Applicants & Institutions





What we will fund...

- National or international travel and accommodation.
- Training courses and programmes of study.
- Books and journal subscriptions to add to your museum's research resources.
- Temporary administrative cover to enable time away from work (including the costs of training another member of staff).



The application form

- Description of the project/activity (including timetable and budget).
- Details of how the research/ activity will further the development of your expertise and professional ambitions, and how it will benefit the collections currently in your care.
- Why you are applying for a grant and why the funding for the proposed research project or activity cannot be found from elsewhere.

Submitted accompanied by CV and letter of support.



Types of grant

Small Grants:

- From £200 £1,500
- No deadline for submission
- Minimum 4 weeks needed to process application
- Up to £20,000 available annually

Large Grants:

- For £1,501 and above
- Considered 3 times annually
- 3 deadlines to work towards (Jan, June, Oct)
- Final 2014 deadline on 1 October
- Up to £30,000 available annually



Key things to remember

- Call or email the Programmes office to discuss any potential application in advance.
- Plan your time and construct your budget carefully.
- Present a clear, compelling and persuasive case with tangible aims and outcomes.



Examples of projects involving:

- Collections development: Research that looks to expand or refresh collections.
- Research into existing collections: Projects that investigate and augment existing holdings.
- Research towards temporary exhibitions: Research into artists or movements which feeds into temporary exhibition programmes.
- Development of permanent gallery displays: Research which explores how permanent collection displays can be updated or revitalized.
- Professional development: Activities that directly enhance professional and specialist skills, contribute to personal development, and expand networks.
